The Bazaruto Archipelago, Mozambique, is best experienced by staring in awe out of the window of a tiny passenger plane. From up here, a fishing net lies suspended like seaweed in the turquoise shallows as local fishermen haul in their catch near Banque Island; the smallest and least developed island of the five in the Archipelago. The image was shot by Jan and Jay Roodie, a husband and wife team who, over the past four years, have flown over 40,000 nautical miles in their light aircraft photographing Southern Africa from above.
